Activity Sheet: Advanced History

In ancient times information about foreign lands came from travellers who shared their stories when they returned home. In Arabian history Sinbad the sailor is an example. It is a fictional collection of stories handed down by Arab sailors during the period between 700 and 1000 AD.
